RCIA CLASSES HAVE BEGUN

Classes for the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) have begun. The next class is Monday, October 29, from 6:30-7:45 p.m. These classes will culminate with reception of the Sacraments at the Easter Vigil in April, 2019. All classes will be held at the rectory, unless there are numerous candidates. If so, and we will move classes to the Church Basement. The RCIA Program is for adults 17 and older who have not been baptized in the Catholic Church or were baptized in an ecclesial community where the Catholic Church does not recognize it as a valid baptism. The program is also for adults who have been validly baptized in the Catholic Church or another Christian community, but have not received their First Communion or Confirmation in the Catholic Church. For youth and children 16 and under who have not been baptized, have not received their 1st Communion (after the 2nd grade), or have not been Confirmed, such students will need to attend Religious Education classes. Any questions regarding the above possibilities can be directed to Fr. Riley before or after Mass, to Mary Sycks (Administrator of Religious Education), or call the rectory at 508-754-8419.

FROM THE PASTOR

This coming Wednesday we celebrate in the Church All Saints Day. This high feast day, known as a Solemnity, was first believed to be celebrated in the 4th century, then known as All Martyrs Day. It makes perfect sense that the great feast of the Saints in the early Church was originally known by the name of Martyrs. Up until the year 313, when Christianity was legalized by the Emperor Constantine, the usual practice of the day, if you will, was to persecute and murder Christians. The highpoint of such persecution took place from the time of our Lord's resurrection (the first Martyr after John the Baptist) through the early 4th century, with the greater number of martyrs dying in the 2nd and 3rd centuries. It became sport for Roman Emperors from Nero (1st century) through Diocletian (late 3rd- early 4th century) to persecute those who worshipped Christ as Savior of the world, and not the Roman Emperor as lord. Thus, thousands who stood steadfast in their faith under threat of death ended up paying the ultimate price for not denying him who is true Lord and Savior.

It's not difficult to see why the Church at this time would set aside a day specifically to remember the devotion and sacrifice of the martyrs, remembering the words of Christ who commanded them to "Deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me" (Mt 16:24), as well as "If the world hates you, realize that it hated me first" (Jn 15:18), and "Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (Mt 5:10). The martyrs were fully aware of these words of Christ, applying them most steadfastly to their faith.

All Martyrs Day has become over the centuries – and most appropriately - All Saints Day. Not that martyrs in the Church are no longer. One of the recent Saints canonized by Pope Francis was Bishop Oscar Romero of El Salvador, who was murdered at the altar in his country in 1980 for speaking out against government forces who abused the poor people of their Latin American country. 1980 is not all that long ago. Thus, when Mass is said in the future on St. Oscar Romero's feast day, the priest will wear red vestments signifying the memorial of a martyr.

For All Martyrs Day to spiritually evolve into All Saints Day is as natural as the human body's need for water. All Saints Day incorporates, of course, more than the martyrs who have died in the name of Christ. This day recollects all those who have followed Christ in the greatest of ways through their faith in him, and not in the world, while living, praying, and working in the world. They have overturned the world's values in their lives, and given us a most excellent example in their particular way of what it means to practice and live out the tenets of Jesus' words and commands. They took his words to the nth degree of seriousness, while never losing their capacity for joy and happiness, knowing they were serving him who promised them life eternal. Eternal life was all the incentive needed for being open to God's grace to operate in their lives, as us older folks witnessed in the lives of St. Teresa of Calcutta and St. John Paul II.

However, I like to say often that not all the saints are known to us in the Communion of Saints. There are those we have known and loved, men, women, and even children who have followed the way of Jesus to perfection by way of humility, or kindness, or mercy, or prayer, or knowledge, or perfection in marriage as a couple, or any combination of these Christian virtues along with many others. They are the ones who were close to us at times, someone we knew from Church or in the workforce, a neighbor or friend, someone who we just knew to be Christlike in their mannerisms and what they stood for in their lives. They chose Christ, and him crucified, rejecting the promises of a world that cannot satisfy the deep recesses of the human heart. Not because they enjoyed persecution in some weird sort of way, but because they understood and believed in the promises of Him who is Lord, possessing the wisdom that this life is short and quick,

THE FACE OF MERCY

“Before his passion, Jesus prayed with this psalm of mercy (*for his mercy endures forever*). Matthew attests to this in his Gospel when he says that, ‘when they had sung a hymn’ (26:30), Jesus and his disciples went out to the Mount of Olives. While he was instituting the Eucharist as an everlasting memorial of himself and his paschal sacrifice, he symbolically placed this supreme act of revelation in the light of his mercy. Within the very same context of mercy, Jesus entered upon his passion and death, conscious of the great mystery of love that he would consummate on the cross. Knowing that Jesus himself prayed this psalm makes it even more important for us as Christians, challenging us to take up the refrain in our daily lives by praying these words of praise: ‘*for his mercy endures forever.*’
